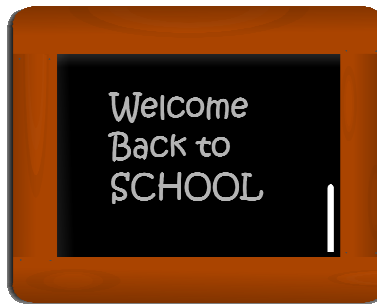
Martin Luther on “Back to School” — Pastor Travis

For some getting back to school is like jumping into a cold pool. It is tough to get in again, but once you get used to the water it is fine. In our house it means getting up earlier, putting together breakfast, making lunches, doing a devotion and prayer, making sure homework is on it's way back to school, and then jumping in the car hopefully all before 7:30 AM. The family fights the routine at first, but then once we are used to it, the routine feels good!

School's purpose is to help our children do well in the world in which we live. Christians do well to make sure our children are ready for the world, “Train up your child in the way they should go and they will not depart from it.” Proverbs 22:7. Yet, Luther reminds us that there are two schools and we dare not neglect the one in favor of the other:

“Furthermore, we see that parents are more to be blamed for the fact that children are disobedient and naughty than the children themselves. For parents are neglectful and do not devote their attention to their children. Nor do such parents deserve to have their children turn out well for them. Well, there is indeed the commandment that parents are to bring up their children in the fear of God; but where are the parents who do it (Ephesians 6:4, Proverbs 1:7)? To be sure, they love their children as the world loves, and they bring them up to know how they must fit themselves into the pattern of the world (the school of the world); but there is no one really to instruct and teach them the care of their souls in the fear of God (the school of the Holy Spirit). Just observe the attitude people take toward this matter, what sort of schools are kept throughout the entire country. No one teaches his children how to pray properly and the matters pertaining to salvation...Some animals devour their own young and destroy their own fruit. People who do not teach and instruct their own children are like that. In fact, if you want to consider this matter from the standpoint of the soul, there is no animal on earth which is as hard toward its young as a human being.”

Admittedly, Luther is blunt about a truth that still plagues us in the 21st century some 500 years after he wrote to the people of Germany: How to



spend enough quality time with our children so that they are prepared for the world and their souls are prepared eternally! Stacy and I still struggle to keep a balance. Most parents as Luther indicates neglect the soul. Likewise today, our schools teach well math, science, history, reading & writing, respect of sports, bullying, and the ways of the world around the locker room and lunch room, leaving the soul empty and seeking fulfillment from parents and church.

Like Germany in 1525, this leaves the parent and the church the task of preparing the soul for eternity. The church is able to teach the 10 Commandments, Creed, Lord's Prayer, Baptism, the Lord's Supper, and the Office of the Keys. Yet, the parent or parents are the ones who teach the children whether these are true and valuable by using them and practicing them in their lives. For example, when my kids get sick, I as a parent can either choose to swear, scream, and complain that I must miss work to watch them or I can pray to the Lord that they get better (Affirming the churches teaching about the Lord's Prayer). Or, when my kid gets in trouble at school I can teach them that what the pastor says is true by condemning the sin and supporting the teachers punishment, but then taking the sin to God and telling them the forgiveness Christ Jesus gives. By just punishing, the parent teaches that the church lies and there is no forgiveness, or by just forgiving the parent teaches the commandments are not really true!

God's blessings to all of you, Calvary's parents, grandparents, and child advocates as you start off a new school year. Pray that the Lord give you wisdom to start off a new school routine that includes school for the soul. The water may feel cold at first, but don't worry you will get used to it with the Lord's help!

Getting to the Heart of Conflict — by Rev. Ted Kober (Part 3)

The Calvary Call July & August editions reprinted the first two segments of this article on conflict, including the roots of “I Desire” and “I Demand” from James 4. The following is the continuation of that article:

I JUDGE

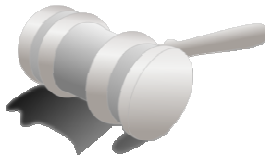
Another sign of idolatry is the inclination to judge other people. When they fail to satisfy our desires and live up to our expectations, we criticize and condemn in our hearts if not with our words. As Dave Powlison writes: We judge others—criticize, nit-pick, nag, attack, condemn—because we literally play God. This is heinous. [The Bible says] “There is only one Lawgiver and Judge, the one who is able to save and to destroy; but who are you to judge your neighbor?” Who are you when you judge? None other than a God wannabe. In this, we become like the Devil himself (no surprise that the Devil is mentioned in James 3:15 and 4:7). We act exactly like the adversary who seeks to usurp God’s throne and who acts as the accuser of the brethren. When you and I fight, our minds become filled with accusations: your wrongs and my rights preoccupy me. We play the self-righteous judge in the mini-kingdoms we establish.

This insight should leave us shaking in our boots! When we judge others and condemn them in our hearts for not meeting our desires, we are imitating the Devil (see James 3:15; 4:7). We have doubled our idolatry problem: Not only have we let an idolatrous desire rule our hearts, but we have also set ourselves up as judging minigods. This is a formula for excruciating conflict.

This is not to say that it is inherently wrong to evaluate or even judge others within certain limits. Scripture teaches that we should observe and evaluate others’ behavior so that we can respond and minister to them in appropriate ways, which may even involve loving confrontation (see Matthew 7:1-5; 18:15; Galatians 6:1).

We cross the line, however, when we begin

to sinfully judge others, which is characterized by a feeling of superiority, indignation, condemnation, bitterness, or resentment. Sinful judging often involves speculating on others’ motives. Most of all, it reveals the absence of a genuine love and concern toward them. When these attitudes are present, our judging has crossed the line and we are playing God.



The closer we are to others, the more we expect of them and the more likely we are to judge them when they fail to meet our expectations. For example, we may look at our spouse and think, “If you really love me, you above all people will help meet this need.” We think of our children and say, “After all I’ve done for you, you owe this to me.”

We can place similar expectations on relatives, close friends, or members of our church. Expectations are not inherently bad. It is good to hope for the best in others and reasonable to anticipate receiving understanding and support from those who are closest to us.

But if we are not careful, these expectations can become conditions and standards that we use to judge others. Instead of giving people room for independence, disagreement, or failure, we rigidly impose our expectations on them. In effect, we expect them to give allegiance to our idols. When they refuse to do so, we condemn them in our hearts and with our words, and our conflicts with them take on a heightened intensity.

I PUNISH

Idols always demand sacrifices. When others fail to satisfy our demands and expectations, our idols demand that they should suffer. Whether deliberately or unconsciously, we will find ways to hurt or punish people so they will give in to our desires.

This punishment can take many forms. Sometimes we react in overt anger, lashing out with hurtful words to inflict pain on those who fail to meet our expectations. When we do so, we

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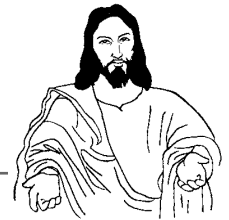

are essentially placing others on the altar of our idol and sacrificing them, not with a pagan knife, but with the sharp edge of our tongue. Only when they give in to our desire and give us what we want will we stop inflicting pain upon them.

But we punish those who don't bow to our idols in numerous other ways as well. Our children may use pouting, stomping, or dirty looks to hurt us for not meeting their desires. Adults and children alike may impose guilt or shame on others by walking around with pained or crushed looks on their faces. Some people even resort to physical violence or sexual abuse to punish and control others. As we grow in faith and awareness of our sin, most of us recognize and reject overt and obviously sinful means of punishing others. But our idols do not give up their influence easily, and they often lead us to develop more subtle means of punishing those who do not serve them.

Withdrawal from a relationship is a common way to hurt others. This may include a subtle coolness toward the other person, withholding affection or physical contact, being sad or gloomy, refusing to look someone in the eye, or even abandoning the relationship altogether. Sending subtle, unpleasant cues over a long period of time is an age-old method of inflicting punishment. (In church deliberately not coming to church is such a way to show displeasure.) For example, a friend of mine mentioned to me that his wife was not pleased with the fact that he was giving so much time to a particular ministry. He closed by saying, "And



as we all know, when momma ain't happy, ain't nobody happy!" He laughed as he said it, but his comment made me think of the proverb, "A quarrelsome wife is like a constant dripping on a rainy day" (Proverbs 27:15). A woman has a unique ability to set the tone in a home. If she is not careful, she can pervert that gift and use it to create an unpleasant or uncomfortable atmosphere that tells her family, "Either get in line with what I want, or you will suffer." Such behavior is an act of unbelief: Instead of relying on God's means of grace to sanctify her family, she depends on her own tools of punishment to manipulate them into change. Of course, a man can do the same thing; by being perpetually critical and unhappy, he too can make everyone in the family miserable until they give in to his idols. The usual result of such behavior is a superficial, splintered family.

Inflicting pain on others is one of the surest signs that an idol is ruling our hearts (see James 4:1-3). When we catch ourselves punishing others in any way, whether deliberately and overtly or unconsciously and subtly, it is a warning that something other than God is ruling our hearts.

“Jesus is Our Savior from Satan” - Michael Kipp, DCE

He who does what is sinful is of the devil, because the devil has been sinning from the beginning. The reason the Son of God appeared was to destroy the devil's work. – 1 John 3:8

Is the devil real? He doesn't really exist, right? WRONG! The devil is a fallen angel. He is called Satan, which means “adversary.” He has one goal. He wants to separate us from God. He doesn't want us to have a relationship with God.

Picture him as a prosecutor standing before the judgment seat of God. He talks about our character flaws like pride, anger, and our evil desires of greed and lust. He's very convincing. And that “father of lies” is not lying. We can't deny what he says about us. It appears his case work will bring about a sentence of eternal damnation for us. Romans 6:23a says, “For the wages of sin is death.”

But wait, Satan doesn't have the last word. *Romans 6:23b, says, “but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.”* Jesus Christ has come to our defense. He set out to defeat the devil and put an end to his evil work. Jesus came to earth not to just hinder, slow down or frustrate the devil and his dealings with us. He came to destroy him. That is exactly what Jesus did by his death on the cross. Jesus' death on the cross in our place is the devil's destruction. All of the devil's accusations about us before God are stopped because on the cross Jesus won the forgiveness for all of our sins. The devil can no longer successfully accuse us before God.

So what does the devil do now if he can't speak to God about our sins? He speaks to us! The devil comes to us reminding us of our sins and tries to convince us that God won't forgive us. This is his last resort. He tries day and night to tempt us to sin and then push us to despair over our condition.

But the victory is already won! The victory belongs to Jesus and by faith it belongs to us. Resist the devil's temptations and he will flee from us. *James 4:7 states, “Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you.”* Satan may try to set traps for us, but we aren't ignorant of his devices. We have the shield of faith in Jesus that extinguishes all the flaming arrows of the evil one (Ephesians 6:16).

So fix our eyes on Jesus, who died for us, and our enemy the devil can't have his wicked way with us. The truth is that the devil's evil work has been destroyed by the Son of God, Jesus Christ. He is our Savior from Satan.

Hebrews 12:2 “Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.”

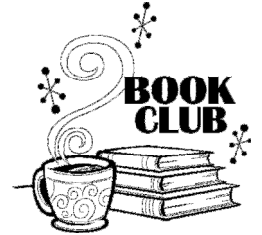
