Happy New Year 2024

Are you alive today because of antibiotics? Penicillin was the first of many miracle drugs that have saved people from once lethal diseases. Back in 1928 Dr. Alexander Fleming, the bacteriologist on duty at St. Mary's Hospital accidently discovered penicillin while growing lethal bacteria. But it was really Dr. Howard Florey and his research assistant Dr. Ernst Chain who stumbled across Fleming's paper and then purified penicillin so that it could be safely used. It took 1000 liters of moldy fluid to make one dose of penicillin for humans. The point, it took a great deal of work to save one person's life. Now antibiotics save millions of people each year. They are still not easy to make, but these wonder drugs often stop bacteria in its tracks. Yet, bacteria is becoming more and more resistant to antibiotics.

Antibiotics may keep you physically alive, but if we are honest Jesus' keeps us physically, mentally, and spiritually alive! Jesus' death and resurrection is the cure for sin, death, and the devil. Jesus' work is a greater miracle far more powerful than penicillin and it will never stop working. Yet, sharing this good news of Jesus requires a great deal of work. Sharing Jesus often means sharing about him one person at a time.

God has given us the silver bullet we call the Gospel, yet it still must be given one dose at a time to people who are dying. Our children need to receive the story of Jesus day after day, year after year. Our neighbors likewise need to hear it, but before we force the dose down we must listen to

them. They need to be loved and forgiven. God designed us to be His instruments to distribute the Gospel: "How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? ¹⁵ And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" Romans 10:14-15

Just As ... I AM: A Bible Study Ephesians 2:1-10

Just As ... I AM: A Bible Study Ephesians 2:1-10 "Just" can mean "barely." "Just" can mean "only." It implies "not enough to measure up." It captures and conveys the burdens we experience existing in a broken world. But "just" also carries a beloved joy for Christians. We have a just (good and right) God. He justifies (forgives and saves) our hearts and lives, and He works justice (defense and vindication) for the victim and the vulnerable.

In the same way, "I AM" sounds familiar and dear to us. "I AM" proclaims the intimate covenant name and identity of our Almighty Father. "I AM" expresses both the confession of our sinful insufficiency and the confidence in our Savior's promises. Our Lord is the God of life and living who brings presence and power.

"Just as I AM" gives us a synonym for the image of God. Every human being, from fertilization to forever, has been made just as the I AM by His • grace. We may receive each neighbor as much a gift and a privilege as the Most High Himself—no matter how their age, appearance, or ability seem to leave them "barely" or "only."

St. Paul, the Apostle's Epistle to the Ephesians, clearly declares and explains this Gospel reality. This second chapter especially gives answer to what makes human life of value. It invites us to think about living and dying in depth beyond how our culture and nature incline us to do. Above all, it lays bare the effects of both human guilt and heavenly grace, and it demonstrates whose activity matters most and where our race's Wednesday January 17 at 7 PM. energy comes from.

- How do you remember first encountering death as a child? What thoughts or feelings do you recall having?
- How does this Scripture define death? How does it characterize living? What makes these differ from customary conceptions? Lutherans For Life
- How does the "walking" in this Scripture involve bodily movements? How might it signify

- other dynamics (and even sometimes the lack or absence of movement)? How can this help reimagine what human life and human beings consist of?
- How does it affect humankind to have "the prince of the power of the air" at work in us?
- Which passions of the flesh do abortion support? How? Which desires of the mind do embryo experimentation or physician-assisted suicide serve? Why?
- What does it mean to have "by nature children of wrath" status?
- Whom might the "us" in this Scripture be referring to or including?
- How has God created human beings? How has He saved them? What does it mean to have a "saved" identity?
- How does this Scripture define and explain grace? How does this apply to human worth and purpose?
- What implications does it have for humanity to have God at work in us?
- What good works do you believe God has prepared for humankind? How do these compare to what the world typically considers as commendable aspirations or accomplishments?

Dear friends in Christ, But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self control; against such things there is no law. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also keep in step with the Spirit. (Galatians 5:22-25 ESV).

Saint Paul speaks of the nine fruits of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. He says that against these, there is no law. The fifth fruit of the Spirit that Paul identifies is kindness. The Greek word for "kindness" is chrēstotēs. It means moral goodness, tender concern, integrity, uprightness. It is kindness of heart and kindness in action.

The call letters of the radio station in Algona, where I served as pastor for 24 years, are KLGA. I have no idea what those letters mean in the world of radio, but those letters became the acronym for our family values. My wife, Darlene and I would remind our children and each other that our family values are to have a Kind, Loving, and Generous Attitude (KLGA) toward one another in our family, in our congregation, and in our community. We like to think of ourselves as "Iowa nice." But kindness is different than just being nice. Nice is good and can be helpful, but kindness goes deeper – it's a genuine reflection of a heart and mind transformed by the Holy Spirit

Kindness is not natural to sinful humans. Kindness is a seed that takes time to grow. A seed fertilized and watered will slowly grow dayby-day into a beautiful flower. It is the same with kindness. Apart from our relationship with Christ, we are by nature unkind and even meanspirited. Kindness is not the default action we have toward others. It is the work of the Holy Spirit who calls us to be kind and gentle with one another. Kindness is God's action in us toward others. We can't do this alone. The Holy Spirit works through the Word and the Sacraments to enlighten our hearts and make us responsive to what He wants us to say and do. Kindness is not just thoughtful feelings; it is intentionally seeking to make the life of someone else better.

We are called to love others and be kind to all, but that does not mean we deny the truth. Kindness sometimes takes the form of rebuke or calling someone to task. When someone speaks a hard truth into your life, it can hurt. Sometimes it feels like they have betrayed you, like they don't understand you anymore, or like they are looking down on you.

Sometimes it is difficult to see what is intended to be an act of kindness in our lives. What at first seems like an attack, may actually be a compassionate act of kindness, calling you back into a relationship with Christ.

God calls Christians to be kind, but sometimes we struggle with knowing what that kindness looks like in everyday life. Where are we supposed to direct our kindness? And to whom? Christian kindness is not just the random act of buying the person behind you a cup of coffee. Jesus says, "Love your neighbor as yourself." But we ask, "Who is my neighbor?" That is a great and very important question. It was this question, asked by a lawyer, that leads Jesus to tell a story about the kindness of a Samaritan. It is recorded for us in Luke 10:25-37 (I encourage you to stop reading this article to look up this text to refresh your memory of this story). A man was robbed and beaten, left to die. A priest and a Levite see this man in need and pass on by. But the Samaritan has pity on the man and offers his kindness. The point of the story is your neighbor is the person who needs your kindness. We are to show merciful kindness to everyone.

It is easy to be angry and outraged at all the problems we are facing in our world. Our natural, be it sinful, response is blaming others and attacking those who disagree with us. Maybe our family's acronym KLGA (Kind, Loving, and Generous Attitude) can help you remember this fruit of the Spirit. Time and again, God gives Christians the opportunity to be kind to our neighbors. Jesus is the one who calls and equips us to be kind, to have tender concern and integrity in all our relationships.

The Importance of Being a Witness by Rev. Keith Haney

Our starting point is Ephesians 2:8-10. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." (ESV)

What a powerful explanation of the work of Christ; grace is the foundation of the Reformation. I have heard it expressed this way. We receive grace not because we deserve it but because God, out of His benevolence, gives it to us as a gift. In contrast, merit is a reward owed to someone for fulfilling the terms of a contract.

With unmerited grace as the foundation, this releases us for the second half of Ephesians 2, verse 10. "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." We were created to reflect Christ's image. Our calling is to be the servants of God. We were made to be people of obedience who live lives of godliness and righteousness. The church is the platform where the message of the Gospel is proclaimed, where the Means of Grace (Baptism and the Lord's Supper) are God's vehicle to bless humankind. In addition to offering forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation, these two gifts sustain and empower the Christian life. Empowered with these gifts from God, believers are God's delivery system to the world.

With that as the foundation, how will your church take this message into the community you serve? Here is a suggestion. Think about the committees you have in your church. Wouldn't it be great if each group or committee planned one outreach event for the year? Imagine setting up an ice fishing event for the men in your area and pairing up a member with an unchurched or a non-member. You could form relationships and share your faith experience if called upon. This could be connected to a sermon the week before or after you invite the people you connect with to church to hear a sermon based on Matthew 4:19-20, "And he said to them, 'Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.' Immediately they left their nets and followed him."

Whether you have 4 or 14 ministry teams in your congregation, this could be a way to intentionally plan events to build relationships in your community. What it takes is planning on the part of the committee and the permission to think outside your everyday routine. But what a fun and natural way to build relationships. Here is the other key: your committee takes the lead and does not expect the pastor to have to do the planning. Keep him in the loop, but do not give him more things to juggle.

January's Book Club choice is West with Giraffes by Lynda Rutledge. They will meet on Thursday, January 19 at 11:30 am.

Woodrow Wilson Nickel, age 105, feels his life ebbing away. But when he learns giraffes are going extinct, he finds himself recalling the unforgettable experience he cannot take to his grave.

It's 1938. The Great Depression lingers. Hitler is threatening Europe, and world-weary Americans long for wonder. They find it in two giraffes who miraculously survive a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic. What follows is a twelve-day road trip in a custom truck to deliver Southern California's first giraffes to the San Diego Zoo. Behind the wheel is the young Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow. Inspired by true events, the tale weaves real-life figures with fictional ones, including the world's first female zoo director, a crusty old man with a past, a young female photographer with a secret, and assorted reprobates as spotty as the giraffes.

Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, West with Giraffes explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it's too late.
